### **Call for Applications**

### Travel Grants for Early Career Professionals and Graduate Students

The AAEA Trust seeks applications for Early Career Professional and Graduate Student Travel Grants. These grants defray housing and transportation costs associated with attending the 2013 AAEA & CAES Annual Meeting in Washington, DC August 4-6, 2013. Up to \$400 will be awarded to each applicant, based on professional merit, financial need, and expected active participation in the Annual Meeting.

A qualifying applicant must be a graduate student or comparatively new junior professional (within three years of award of your last degree) engaged at an accredited U.S. college, university, or other institution in such applied economics fields as agribusiness, agricultural, consumer, food, development, environmental, health, marketing, regional, rural, or resource economics. Reflecting the Trust's goal of broadening par-

ticipation in the Annual Meeting, preference may be given to individuals working under institutional circumstances not normally conducive to AAEA meeting attendance.

Applications must be submitted through the online application form. You will be asked to submit the following:

- 1. Your name, postal address, e-mail address, and phone number;
- Your current status, including: young professional or graduate student; department and institution at which enrolled or employed; degree program underway or recently completed; years at institution; brief summary of research area; and professional rank or anticipated graduation date;
- Description of your interest and/or planned participation in the Joint Annual Meeting;

- 4. Proposed travel budget, including other funding sources available, such as from the your institution; and
- 5. A nomination from a department, division head, or supervisor which includes written acknowledgement of the nomination and certification of your financial need, including certification that funding is unavailable from other sources.

Applications should be submitted by the individual seeking support; however, only one application from each department or division will be considered. In the event that more than one application is submitted from a specific department or division, it will be up to the department head to decide which will be considered. Applications will be accepted only from U.S. colleges, universities, and institutions. The deadline for submission is April 15, 2013.

## AAEA Extension Section to Host Symposium on Crop Insurance and the Farm Bill

AAEA is pleased to announce the upcoming stand-alone symposium "Crop Insurance and the Farm Bill: A New Paradigm in U.S. Agricultural Policy" to be held October 8-9, 2013 in Louisville, KY. The symposium is jointly organized by the AAEA Extension Section, Farm Credit Services of America, and the National Crop Insurance Service. The symposium will consist of three sessions over one and one-half days. Session I will be a plenary session of four invited papers. Sessions II and III will consist of two to three concurrent sessions, each drawn from submissions to the Call for Papers.

Since the inception of the U.S. agricultural policies in the early 1930s, the Farm Bills enacted have centered on various iterations of supply controls, price supports and/or direct transfers. In the current political climate, a paradigm shift seems to be underway toward alternative risk management strategies-primarily subsidized crop insurance offerings-to help mitigate the substantial risks inherent in agricultural production and marketing. In this symposium, the effects and impacts of the proposed shift to crop insurance as the primary tool for risk management in agriculture will be examined and assessed.

Potential topic areas to be explored include the interaction between crop insurance and traditional Title 1 farm support programs; rating and delivery challenges related to more widespread reliance on insurance; innovations in the tools and techniques for crop insurance analysis; and the intersection between crop insurance and farm management decisions.

## Call for submissions 2014 ASSA Annual Meeting

President-Elect Julie Caswell is soliciting proposals for AAEA invited paper sessions at the 2014 Allied Social Sciences Association (ASSA) Annual Meeting in Philadelphia, PA, January, 3-5, 2014. Preference will be given to those proposals that add to knowledge on public issues of national and international importance or expand capabilities and tools for economic research.

The objective of AAEA sessions at the ASSA Annual Meeting is to share new knowledge with members of other economics associations as well as with AAEA members. Sessions may be jointly sponsored with other ASSA member associations. AAEA encourages sessions that will draw widely from ASSA attendees. Therefore, preference will be given to proposals that jointly serve the interests of the AAEA and other economists more broadly.

Papers in these Invited Paper sessions may be published in the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics* in August 2014. Papers will go through a review process, and it is not guaranteed that all papers in an accepted session will be published. Papers submitted for review should be in their publish-ready state because there will not be time for multiple versions and reviews. Discussant comments will not be published.

Proposed session formats with three papers and one discussant or four papers without a discussant are permitted. Proposals for sessions without a discussant must include a clear plan for ensuring and fostering participant interaction. Journal page allocations will be the same for all sessions, regardless of format, and discussant remarks will not be published in the journal. Please note that sessions at ASSA are two hours in length.

Proposals will be reviewed and selected by a subcommittee of the AAEA Board.

Proposals should be submitted to Kristen Wright at kwright@aaea.org. They should include the proposed session title and paper titles, as well as the names, addresses, phone numbers, and e-mail addresses of the session organizer, moderator, paper presenters, and discussants. A brief (approximately two pages) justification of the session, and one paragraph abstract describing the objective of, and new knowledge generated by, each paper, should also be included. It is the responsibility of the organizer to ensure that all individuals identified in the proposal are willing to participate.

All presenters/speakers/discussants must be members of AAEA. A membership waiver request can be included in the proposal in the case of extenuating circumstances. In addition, participants need to register for the ASSA meeting. AAEA cannot grant registration waivers for the meeting.

Climate Science Day on Capitol Hill

On February 26-27, 2013, Dr. Bruce McCarl (Texas A&M University) traveled to Washington, DC to participate in the multi-disciplinary event that attracted 50 scientists from a variety of science organizations. The purpose of the event was to provide Members of Congress the best possible access to scientific information on climate science when making policy decisions. This non-partisan event, organized by the Climate Science Working Group (CSWG), did not subscribe to any particular policy or course of action. Dr. McCarl and others also met with seven Congressional offices to offer science and information.

"The Public Benefits of Federal Food Assistance Programs Far Outweigh Their Public Costs"

By: Dr. Jean Kinsey, Professor Emeritus in the Department of Applied Economics at the University of Minnesota.

Nearly one in every four Americans participates in at least one of the Federal domestic food assistance programs that provide a nutritional safety net for millions of children and low-income adults. The economics of Federal food programs

involve weighing the costs and benefits of investing in food availability for low-income households. Federal expenditures for feeding programs reduce hunger, poverty, and health care costs. Furthermore, food and nutrition assistance programs are an investment in the human capabilities and the economic health of the nation.

The report was funded by The McK-night Foundation and The Walton Family Foundation and was released on January 30, 2013. The report has been distributed to key Congressional offices, and decision makers.

#### Julian Hutchinson Atkinson

Dr. Atkinson came to Purdue as a graduate student in February 1951 and has been associated with the University ever since. Professor Atkinson's career included the traditional land grant college activities of research, teaching, and extension as well as work in international development. His research and extension work included such diverse areas as farm mutual insurance company management, contract hog production, agricultural banking, farm management, outlook, land values and land tenure. He has taught farm management, farm finance, farm appraisal, international development, macroeconomics and, in Portuguese, farm finance, land economics and research methods.

Nearly 20% of Atkinson's long tenure was away from campus and included work with the Farm Credit Administration, the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, the U.S. Agency for International Development, the University of Florida, and Auburn University. He also completed assignments in Portugal, Guinea-Bissau, Brazil, and several other Latin American countries.

Dr. Atkinson served for over a decade as secretary-treasurer of the Indiana Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers. He was director of the School of Farm Mutual Insurance Company Management and the Purdue Agricultural Banking School, and also coordinator of the Purdue Agricultural Bankers Clinic, annual Production Credit

Association seminar, and various other extension programs. At the time of his retirement, he was best known for his work in land values and leasing arrangements.

Upon his retirement, Dr. Atkinson paid tribute to four living persons who had a great influence on his education and his professional life: Earl L. Butz, Lowell S. Hardin, Howard G. Diesslin and Richard L. Kohls. In addition, the friendship of these men and their wives, Mary Emma, Mary, Mickey and Irene has been much appreciated by Estelle and Jake.

Estelle, who died in 1993, and Jake are parents of Cynthia, Thomas and Virginia. Their grandchildren are Estelle and Susan Atkinson.

### **Paul L. Farris**

Paul L. Farris, 93, of West Lafayette, died on January 10, 2013.

Dr. Farris was born November 10, 1919, near Vincennes, to James D. and Fairy J. Farris. He married Rachel Rutherford on August 16, 1953, in Springport, and resided in West Lafayette.

He was a faculty member in Agricultural Economics at Purdue University from 1952 to 1990, serving as Department Head from 1973 to 1982. He was a principal graduate teacher, researcher and supervisor of graduate students in agricultural marketing, prices and policy, serving as major professor for more than 25 PhD and 15 MS students and member of the advisory committee for over 100 other graduate students. He published with others more than 100 research-oriented publications and was the editor of two books on agricultural marketing research. He participated in the University Senate and the development of a strategic plan for Indiana agriculture.

Professor Farris also served with the Economic Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, in 1962, the National Commission on Food Marketing in 1965-66, and part-time with the Cooperative

State Research Service, USDA, beginning in 1984. For several years he was a member of the Educational Advisory Committee of the Chicago Board of Trade and the Editorial Board of the Review of Futures Markets. He was an early member of the AAEA Foundation Governing Board and Governing Board President in 1987-88. He was elected a Fellow of the American Agricultural Economics Association in 1988.

He was raised on a family farm near Vincennes and graduated from Decker High School in 1936. He worked on the family farm during the Depression years. He was inducted into the Army in September 1941 and served until December 1945. He initially was assigned to Riverside and Oakland, California, and then was accepted into Air Force Administrative Officers Candidate School at Miami Beach, Florida. graduating as a Second Lieutenant in April 1943. He served in Chicago and Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and was promoted to First Lieutenant in April 1944, before being assigned to the India China Division of the Air Transport Command, located in Tezpur, India. He was promoted to Captain in February 1945, and helped to open an air base in Luhsien, China, before WWII ended.

Following military service, he earned the BSA from Purdue in 1949, MS from University of Illinois in 1950, and PhD from Harvard University in 1954.

Survivors are his wife, Rachel; his daughter, Nancy R. Harvey (husband Douglas), of New Palestine; and three sons: Paul J. Farris (wife Patty), of Ellensburg, Wash.; John L. Farris (wife, Julie), of State College, Pa., and Carl S. Farris (wife Darlene) of Danvers, Mass. Grandchildren are Monica, Colleen, Brian and Benjamin Harvey of New Palestine; Taylor, Mariah, Rachel and Amanda Farris of Ellensburg, Wash.; Jacob, Joseph and Anna Farris of State College, Pa., and Adam and Madeleine Farris of Danvers, Mass.

Also surviving are a brother, Joseph W. Farris of Vincennes, and sisters Carolyn L. Kelsey of Indianapolis, and Dorothy C. Rae of Chicago. Another brother, J. Earl Farris of Vincennes, preceded him in death. Services were conducted January 15, at Community United Methodist Church, 1548 South Hart Street Road, Vincennes.

### **Milton Charles Hallberg**

Milton Charles Hallberg, 76, passed away on November 15, 2012. He was born on April 14, 1936, in Monmouth, Ill. He received his BS and MS degrees from the University of Illinois and his PhD degree from Iowa State University. He accepted a position as Assistant Professor of Agricultural Economics at Penn State University in 1965 and retired from that Department in 1998 as Professor Emeritus of Agricultural Economics. While at Penn State, he taught courses and undertook research in quantitative methods for agricultural economists and courses in the general area of agricultural policy. During his tenure at Penn State he supervised 35 graduate degree candidates and served as interim Head of the Department on two separate occasions. He was a visiting scholar at the Economic Research Service of USDA,

Visiting Professor of Agricultural Economics at Oklahoma State University, Thurburn Visiting Fellow at the University of Sydney in Australia, Visiting Research Professor at The Christian-Albrechts-Universität (Kiel, Germany), and Visiting Professor of Agricultural Economics at Queen's University in Belfast. He has also lectured at Universities and research institutes in Santurce, Puerto Rico; Seoul, Korea; Uppsala and Stockholm, Sweden; Ås, Norway; Castelar, Buenos Aires, Argentina; Montevideo, Uruguay; and Warsaw, Poland.

Prior to beginning his college career, Milton Hallberg was employed as a depot agent for the CB&Q railroad in Illinois which led him to a somewhat unique interest in his retirement years - creating a database of all railroads ever chartered in the U.S. and

Canada - which he made available free to all interested railroad fans via the Internet. He was also an avid golfer, and an avid reader. In addition to his other interests during retirement, he was actively involved in studying U.S. agricultural history. To facilitate this study, he constructed a long-term database of the U.S. agricultural sector over the last two centuries and in cooperation with his grandson, wrote a rather extensive historical timeline of various U.S. events since the early 1700s.

Milton is survived by his wife of 57 years, Pauline (Boyer) Hallberg; his son, Brian Hallberg; grandson, Brandon Hallberg; and granddaughter, Gretchen Hallberg; sisters, Vivian George, Ruth Baylor, and Jeanette Hallberg; and brother, Leon Hallberg.

#### **David William Holland**

In 1941, David William Holland was born in Laramie, WY, to David Holland Sr. and Sylvia (Dwehus) Holland. From that moment until his accident February 11, 2013, while SCUBA diving in Cozumel, Mexico, he pursued a love affair with the natural world. Fiercely independent and with no patience for wastes of his time, David barely graduated from Grand Junction High School in Colorado. He far preferred to hunt, fish and work on his turquoise hot-rod. He later told his children that in winter he would leave his house on moonlit nights to ice-skate along frozen irrigation canals.

In the late fall of 1965, while attending Colorado State University, David occasionally went over "to have coffee" with a Rita Thompson who worked at the front desk of the Student Center. She liked his loafers. They married six months later on May 13, 1966, in the backyard of Rita's mother's house. Rita was studying to be a dietitian, so for the next 47 Thanksgivings, he would have to sneak his second, third and fourth butter-horn roll.

In 1967, David graduated from CSU with a BS and an MS in economics. He always wanted good answers, whether it was how market forces drove local economies or why Jim Crow laws existed at all. In 1963, he and three friends were arrested in Montgomery, AL., while marching with the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.

David's love for explanations and for the natural world quickly blended. He defended his doctorate in agricultural economics at Oklahoma State University in 1972, working first at the University of Kentucky and then joining the faculty at Washington State University in 1973 in Pullman. Graduate students knew him to be a demanding-yet-loyal mentor, and undergrads as someone who wouldn't let them use calculators.

Never shrinking from a fray, he was involved in a few ag-econ controversies in his 35-year career, including an assessment of the spotted owl in the early 1980's and a field-burning controversy in the 1990's. Sometimes David's explanations made people uncomfortable.

In 1982, David and Rita packed their young family onto a plane bound for Lesotho, a small nation surrounded by apartheid South Africa. There he worked with a USAID farming systems project. The three children attended an international prep school. These years were punctuated by stunning landscapes and wildlife, racial inequality, international friendships and a Monopoly game board written in Afrikaans.

Gardens flourished under David's care. In Lesotho, the family ate apricots; in Pullman, Bing cherries; and once he retired to Redmond, OR, he had to explain to the neighbors when his hops plant crawled under the fence. His children were often his apprentices, learning to mow, prune, lop, plant and weed at young ages. Rita's rhubarb meringue made the work worth it.

Professionally, David understood the economic development of small communities in the American west, as well as overseas, in a way that few did. He targeted projects that could be used immediately by regular people. He was known for his honest and meticulous work, especially when his conclusions were inconvenient or politically explosive. Toward the end of his career, he won a Fulbright to execute similar studies in Chile.

But David's university contributions were just as often personal - family holidays were frequently attended by "orphan" graduate students from far-away places such as Burma, India, Lesotho and California.

One of his earliest Basotho mentees heads the IMF for the African continent.

In 2008, David and Rita retired to a wonderful community of close friends in Redmond. Here David continued his pursuits. He continued battling lovingly with the Spanish language, earned a Master Gardener certification as another garden flourished, fished more rivers, and spent sunny afternoons skiing at Mt. Bachelor while Rita read in the lodge.

Indeed, David was accompanied everywhere by Rita, his beloved travel companion and sparring partner. They might have argued about how best to drive a car, but they had the exact same opinions on important issues like the support of family, the value of hard work, and putting their children on speaker-phone. Rita made him delicious healthy food. He took her around the world.

In many ways David remained the frugal young outdoorsman from Grand Junction. He was never satisfied with easy answers. He was always willing to meet someone in the middle if they were ready to work hard. He once hooked three steelhead in one afternoon on the Grande Ronde River. He was a strong person.

He will be deeply missed by many. These include David's brother, Paul, and wife, Judy Holland of Reno, NV; sister, Marsha, and husband, Virgil Miller of Colorado Springs, CO; daughter Julia Watters with grandchild Jacob Watters of Seattle, WA.; daughter and son-in-law Sarah and Mark Diestler with grandchild Morgan Diestler of Highlands Ranch, CO; son, Joshua Holland, of Santa Fe, NM; and loving wife, Rita Holland, of Redmond, OR.
