Selected Presentation Papers and Posters Call for Abstracts

AAEA seeks submissions for Selected Presentations for the 2025 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting in Denver, CO. Selected Presentations are a submission category that represents both Selected Papers and Selected Posters. All submissions are reviewed together, and only after acceptance, will the submissions be assigned as a paper or poster presentation. At the time of submission, individuals will have the option for their submission to be considered as a poster only. There is no paper only option.

Submissions for Selected Presentations must include a two-page maximum, single-spaced abstract that provides a clear explanation of what will be presented at the Annual Meeting. Authors should include in this abstract a discussion of the relevance of the topic, research methodology, and potential for generating discussion during the meeting. Please *do not include your name, contact information, and sources in the abstract file.*

Abstracts must be received by **January 15, 2025, at 11:59 pm CST,** and must be submitted using AAEA's online <u>Abstract Management System</u>. Material previously presented at other meetings cannot be accepted, and the submitting author will be asked to verify that the material has not been presented elsewhere. When entering the title of your abstract, please be sure to submit the title as you would like it to appear in the program – with proper title capitalization and punctuation.

When submitting your abstract to the abstract system you will need to select three subject codes. The first subject code you select is the subject your abstract will be grouped in when being reviewed. This is an important step as it ensures your abstract will be reviewed by those with expertise in that particular subject. The second or third selected subject code may be used later during the scheduling process if your abstract is accepted.

To assist you with selecting a subject code, the Selected Presentations Committee has created <u>keywords for each of the subject codes</u>. We recommend you refer to the keywords for subject codes to help you determine the appropriate subject code for your submission.

If accepted, sessions are comprised of abstracts with the same subject codes. All accepted abstracts will be presented in person only.

Review Process

All submissions will be subjected to a common, double-blind review process. After the review process has been completed, topic leaders will construct coherent Selected Paper Sessions and Lightning Sessions based on a common topic. All remaining accepted presentations will be assigned as posters. Presentation proposal acceptance notifications will be sent via email from the AAEA Business Office in late March. Emails may be received in spam folders. Should you not find an email by mid-April, please feel free to contact the AAEA Business Office at info@aaea.org or at (414) 918-3190.

Posters

Poster authors should be available during their assigned intervals during the meeting for questions and discussion. The event program and mobile app will list the poster titles, authors, locations, and presentation time. Poster presenters must submit a PDF version of their poster to the AAEA submission site by **May 14**, **2025**. Uploads must be below 4 MB in size to be uploaded. AAEA will upload these posters to the AgEcon Search. Posters that miss this deadline will be withdrawn from the program.

Selected Paper Sessions and Lightning Sessions

Up to 8 papers are included in a 90-minute Lightning Session, and up to 4 papers are included in a 90-minute Selected Paper Session. Therefore, each paper presentation in a Lightning Session is allotted 9 minutes, with 7 minutes to present and 2 minutes for discussion. Likewise, each presentation in a Selected Paper Session is allotted 20 minutes, with 15 minutes for presentation and 5 minutes for discussion.

Authors of Selected Papers must submit a full PDF version of their paper to the AAEA submission site by **May 14, 2025.** You may submit an updated version later. Uploads must be below 4 MB in size to be uploaded. AAEA will upload these papers to the AgEcon Search. Papers that miss this deadline will be withdrawn from the program. The full version of the paper has no length limitations, but less than 25 pages is preferred. Double—

spaced, 8.5 by 11-inch, single-sided format is requested. Please follow the *American Journal of Agricultural Economics* style guidelines, apart from the single table/figure per page convention.

Additional Important Information

If accepted, presenters of papers and/or posters <u>must be a current 2025 member</u> of AAEA and registered for the 2025 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting **by May 14, 2025.** Presenters who miss this deadline will be withdrawn from the program. If your institution will be registering you for the annual meeting, please be sure to notify them of this deadline to ensure that you are registered by the deadline.

AAEA seeks submissions for Organized Symposia for the 2025 AAEA & WAEA Joint Annual Meeting in Denver, CO. Proposals are due by January 15, 2025, and should be submitted using AAEA's online submission system.

The Abstract Management System is now open.

Organized Symposium sessions highlight ideas or works-in-progress on a topic involving cooperative or competing efforts by two or more panelists. Symposia may involve panel discussions of prepared questions, debates, roundtable meetings, or other formats. Formal paper presentations are discouraged, nonetheless if such presentations are proposed, the organizer should explain how they will fit into a tightly coherent theme. In all cases, at least half of the session time should be reserved for discussion among the panelists and between the panelists and the audience.

Symposia may offer discussions of policy issues, research methods, emerging research results, teaching or outreach topics, issues in professional organization, or other matters. Proposals should include: session title, session rationale, names and contact information for the organizer and other participants, and a description of the symposium format that includes plans for discussion.

At least one proposer for the organized symposium must be a member of AAEA, and all presenters, speakers, and/or discussants at the Annual Meeting must be members of AAEA and registered for the Annual Meeting by May 14, 2025.

All presenters must present in-person.

Call for Applications JAAEA Area Editor

The AAEA Board seeks applicants to serve four-year terms as Area Editors for the *Journal of the Agricultural* and Applied Economics Association (JAAEA). They will join a diverse group of scholars who helped launch the JAAEA. Applications from Scholars across all fields of interest to the broad membership of AAEA are welcome.

Area Editors at the JAAEA are responsible for handling manuscripts in consultation with the Founding/Managing Editor. Manuscripts are assigned by the Founding/Managing Editor to Area Editors who are responsible for soliciting reviews and based on the reviews and their reading of the paper, making a recommendation to the Founding/Managing Editor. The workload for Area Editors involves handling 15-20 papers a year. Area Editors will also help with shortlisting papers for the journal's best paper award.

Being an Area Editor at *JAAEA* offers the opportunity to serve in an important editorial role, without committing the high workload associated with the serving as the managing editor. A goal of the journal is to provide a platform for training AAEA's next generation of Editors.

Government Relations & Washington Update

Congress Averts Government Shutdown, Extends Farm Bill

In a move to avoid a government shutdown, Congress approved a <u>funding package</u> on Friday that ensures the federal government remains open until March 14, 2025. The bipartisan agreement maintains funding at current levels while addressing several pressing issues. The package includes a one-year extension of the 2018 Farm Bill, preventing disruptions to agricultural programs that would have reverted to permanent law, with dairy programs among the first to face impacts. Additionally, it allocates \$100 billion in disaster relief and \$10 billion in assistance to farmers, reflecting the pressing needs of communities affected by natural disasters and market conditions.

The package was the subject of much controversy as the December 20th deadline approached. The original version of the bill was over 1500 pages long and included numerous unrelated programs. President–elect Donald Trump and close ally Elon Musk were among the initial package's detractors, leading to significant revisions that were ultimately approved by Congress and signed into law. One outstanding issue that Trump urged to be included was addressing the debt ceiling. The absence of a debt ceiling provision means the Republican controlled Congress will have to tackle increasing the debt limit early in 2025.

The extension of the Farm Bill gives Congress additional time to finalize a new bill. House Agriculture Committee Chairman Glenn "GT" Thompson has reaffirmed his commitment to advancing a comprehensive five-year Farm Bill early in 2025. Thompson emphasized the importance of long-term reauthorization to provide stability for farmers and address emerging challenges such as food security, climate resilience, and agricultural innovation.

Agriculture Committee Rosters Take Shape for Next Congress

As Congress prepares for a new session in January 2025, the parties have selected who will be the chairs and ranking members for committees. With Republicans taking control of the Senate, John Boozman (R-AR) will become chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee. Other Senate Republicans on the committee can be

found <u>here</u>. Debbie Stabenow (D-MI), who had been the leading Democrat on the committee has retired and Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) will become Ranking Member. The full Democrat roster can be found <u>here</u>.

In the House, GT Thompson (R-PA) will continue to chair the House Agriculture Committee. The full list of Republican members on the House Agriculture Committee can be found here. House Democrats have selected Angie Craig (D-MN) to serve as Ranking Member, replacing David Scott (D-GA) as the top Democrat on the committee. A full list of House Democrat members has yet to be released.

Biden Administration Makes Final Push on Regulations

As with all outgoing administrations, The Biden Administration is working to finalize a number of regulations before the end of his term. A few USDA rules of note that are expected to be completed before the Trump Administration takes over include:

Fair and Competitive Livestock and Poultry Markets – The Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) has proposed a rule under its authorities given by the Packers and Stockyards Act to address unfair practices. USDA defines unfair practices as conduct that harms market participants and conduct that harms the market. The proposed rule, expected to be finalized in January, would:

- Define "unfair practice" with respect to *market participants* as a practice that
 - o causes or is likely to cause substantial injury to one or more market participants, which
 - o the participant or participants cannot reasonably avoid, and which
 - the regulated entity that has engaged in the act cannot justify by establishing countervailing benefits to the market participant or participants or to competition in the market that outweighs the substantial injury or likelihood of substantial injury.
- Defines "unfair practice" with respect to markets as a practice that:
 - is a collusive, coercive, predatory, restrictive, deceitful or exclusionary method of competition that may negatively affect competitive conditions.

Poultry Grower Payment Systems and Capital Improvement Systems – The proposed rule would (1) prohibit payment practices that reduce or discount payment rates in a contract under poultry grower ranking systems (commonly known as tournaments) used in contract poultry production for broiler chickens, (2) establish a duty of fair comparison to ensure that grower comparisons are conducted in a reasonable and equitable way that does not disadvantage specific growers and requires live poultry dealers (LPDs) to adopt policies and procedures in furtherance of operating a fair ranking system for broiler growers, and (3) requires LPDs to provide certain information to broiler growers when the LPD requests or requires the grower to make additional capital investments to guard against deception and to enable USDA to better enforce existing prohibitions on unfair additional capital investments adopted in 2011 (9 CFR 201.216). In addition, the proposed rule also highlights the importance USDA and the Department of Justice's ongoing efforts to enforce the Packers & Stockyards Act prohibition on unfair practices through case-by-case enforcement. AMS intends for the proposed regulations to address unfairness and deception in broiler grower payments, tournament operations, and capital improvement systems.

These and other rules finalized at the end of the Biden Administration will come under scrutiny by the incoming Trump Administration. New administrations historically have paused the enforcement of last-minute rulemakings of the previous administration to allow for a review. Trump and the Republican controlled Congress may also elect to use the Congressional Review Act to cancel controversial regulations finalized within the last 60 legislative days (dating back to August). Rolling back EPA regulations was a target of the first Trump Administration and will likely be a focus again in his second term.

USDA and FDA Release Dietary Guidelines Committee Report

On December 10th, USDA and FDA jointly announced the availability of the Scientific Report of the 2025 Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee on <u>DietaryGuidelines.gov</u>. The report contains the 2025 Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee's findings and advice to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The report has been met with criticism from animal agriculture as it discounts the nutritional contributions of meat and recommends decreased intake of red meat and increased plant-based protein consumption. The report, alongside public comments and federal agency input, will inform the two departments as they develop the *Dietary Guidelines for Americans*, *2025–2030*, which is expected to be published in late 2025.
